Allotment News

I volunteered to write this piece then swiftly realised that I am not really qualified to provide Allotment News as I mainly enjoy the results from Kevin's allotment rather than contribute in any meaningful way to the production of it. So, to avoid Imposter Syndrome I am presenting some Allotment themed information and have called this an Article rather than News.

The tradition of allotment holding in Britain harks back to Anglo - Saxon times when swathes of land were commonly held for growing food, grazing livestock and collecting firewood.

The system we recognise today has its roots in the Nineteenth Century, when, following the rapid industrialisation of the Country some land was given over for the provision of food growing. Often provisions relating to use and the behaviour of the users were included in agreements. One Allotment Tenancy Agreement dating back to 1846 serving the Parish of Husbands Bosworth states "Every occupier is expected to attend divine service on Sundays; and any occupier who digs potatoes or otherwise works on his land on Sunday shall immediately forfeit the same."

At the end of the First World War land started to be made more widely available, primarily as a way of assisting returning service men (Land Settlement Facilities Act 1919)

Acts of Parliament followed in the 1920s and have been developed over the years to the system we have today with Allotments being owned and operated by a mixture of Local Authorities and private owners.

The following statistics from the Guardian newspaper (October 2023) relating to Council owned allotments illustrate how allotment popularity has exploded in the last 12 years. In 2012 there were approximately 86,787 allotment plots Nationwide and by October 2023 that had grown to approximately 157,820.

The average waiting time for a Council allotment was 3 years but the longest waiting time was in Islington North London which had a 15 year wait. Bristol had the longest waiting list with 7,630 people on it.

Bushton Manor Plant Fair and Open Garden Bank Holiday Monday May 6th 11-3

Although we had parking issues, the Plant Fair last year was very successful with over 1000 visitors – we hope to be able to use the parking on site in 2024!

The 18th Century Manor House has delightful gardens and this Plant Fair is the only time they are open to the public. About 30 Stalls with Plants, Crafts, Food and other garden related items are scattered throughout the courtyard and lawns. Purchases can be left at the Plant Crèche so that you don't need to carry them around with you. And you can relax on the lawns enjoying home made refreshments or a Bacon Butty from the BBQ. Games and a Treasure Hunt can keep young people occupied.

Entrance is £3*. No charge for children or car parking. Dogs on leads are welcome.

Money raised will go to the St Peter's Church Roof Fund, a Grade 1 listed building in Clyffe Pypard.
